Your comments regarding walkthroughs and their impact on feedback and staff efficacy using tools like Excel and a clear master schedule are insightful. Having agreements about what, when, and how we do things fosters a system that encourages feedback for improvement.

Highlighting the importance of core instruction is a vital reminder—core instruction indeed matters most. Your suggestion to consider teacher input in the development of a master schedule is invaluable. Acknowledging and building on the expertise of those dealing with the master schedule daily is a wise approach.

Your commitment to social-emotional learning, particularly through the community breakfast in response to trauma, is commendable. Your desire to enhance collaboration between special ed and general ed staff, linked to your recommendations for inclusion and a least restrictive environment, is forward-thinking and student-focused.
